A Grear Day For The American People - No More Kings!

The Great Reclamation has begun. The Supreme Court just restored Trump's constitutional power to remove rogue commissioners from federal agencies. For the first time in ninety years, the President can clean house. The walls of bureaucratic tyranny are cracking.

Since 1935, the presidency has been a hostage. A hidden ruling called **Humphrey's Executor v. United States** created a shield around unelected bureaucrats buried inside so-called independent agencies. They could not be fired. Not by Congress. Not by the people. Not even by the Commander in Chief. These were the Deep State's castles inside the government. Protected. Untouchable. Writing rules with the power of law while answering to no one.

For decades, they dictated policy, destroyed accountability, and made every president a figurehead in his own house.

When Congress authorized the Civil Service employees the right to "Collective Bargaining," (unionize) President Roosevelt told Congress that we would *"Woe the day we allowed this to happen."* He was obviously reading the tea leaves right.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs is just one of the multitude of Government Agency's that operated as an independent entities within the maze Government Departments.

Until 1976, with the passage of President Nixon's signature legislation, P.L. 93-638 the Indian Self-Determination and Education Act, the Bureau of Indian Affairs controlled ever aspect of the American Indian Tribal affairs.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs was and still is one of the Government agencies that undermined P.L. 93-638 to the point it became barely functional.

That ended this week. Thank you Jesus!

In a ruling few expected but history will never forget, the Supreme Court confirmed that President Trump has full constitutional authority to remove Democratic commissioners Mary Boyle, Richard Trumka Jr, and Alexander Hoehn-Saric from the Consumer Product Safety Commission. The Court reminded the nation that executive power belongs to the President alone. Not to agencies. Not to boards. Not to faceless lawyers.

The 6-3 decision has detonated the foundation of bureaucratic immunity. Trump can now terminate



any commissioner who obstructs reform, **dismantle ideological mandates**, and reclaim executive control over agencies that have operated like private empires. The ruling sets a precedent that can sweep through every corner of the federal maze — FTC, SEC, NLRB, CDC, FDA, DOE. Hundreds of unelected operators who hid behind the term **"independent"** are now exposed.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission is only the beginning. Nearly 700 positions across Washington fall under the same model. With this judgment, Trump holds the legal weapon he was denied in his first term. The sword is back in his hands.

Inside the Deep State, panic has already begun. For decades, they didn't need to win elections. They only needed to control who stayed behind. By embedding loyal operatives inside untouchable posts, they guaranteed their agenda survived every presidency. They wrote laws under the cover of regulation. They censored industries through **"safety standards."** They shifted policy without ever standing for a vote. That structure is now collapsing.

This decision is not about staffing. It's about sovereignty. The hidden coup that began ninety years ago has been reversed. The unelected state no longer outranks the elected one. The legal scaffolding that protected the regime is being dismantled piece by piece.

That is why the media is silent. They understand what this means. If Trump uses this authority — and he will — the entire architecture of shadow governance will fall. Agencies that weaponized policy for ideology will be stripped of power. Mandates will be rescinded. Political infiltrators will be removed. The Deep State's invisible army is finally within reach.

Trump's second term begins now, with the power he was denied in 2016. The presidency is no longer a cage. It is a command post. He can purge the administrative state, rebuild federal institutions that answer to the people, and restore a government that serves its citizens instead of its masters.

This is The Great Reclamation. The end of ninety years of executive humiliation. The day the balance returns. The Deep State buried the presidency under red tape and called it democracy. But the chains have been cut. And Trump now holds the axe.

The American Indian Tribal Governments bondage of regulations will take some time to unravel, but President Trump has already shown his support for the reduction and elimination of the over-regulations of Tribal Governments. In way of example, for a tribe to gain approval to establish a oil development business they must comply with 14 regulations while a non-tribal company has only 4 regulations to comply with to get permitted. No accountability to voters, just special interests, lawyer says

"The legislature in California had to violate the California Constitution five different times in order to even put Prop 50 before the voters," according to constitutional and election law attorney [Mark Meuser](#) with the Dhillon Law Group.

The California Constitution only allows mid-decade redistricting if voters pass a referendum or a court says the maps are unconstitutional, neither of which have happened. Meuser explained, *"What Prop 50 does is create a third way where special interests in*

D.C. can get legislatures to draw new maps where they can create safe seats for their friends so that congressmen are not required to be accountable to the voters. When politicians are not accountable to the voters but accountable to special interests, we the people lose."

The overtly partisan language may seem jarring, but according to Meuser, the racially charged language used when debating the bill may be the most legally problematic aspect for supporters of Prop 50.

California Faces Record Breaking \$8 Gas After Historic LA Refinery Shuts Down

California's Phillips 66 Los Angeles refinery is scheduled to cease operations in October 2025, resulting in a daily reduction of 139,000 barrels (approximately 8% of the state's capacity). While officials dispute predictions, UC Berkeley's Borenstein warns of *'severe gasoline shortage and unprecedented price increase.'*

According to AAA, the current average gas price is \$4.66 per gallon. The relationship between capacity loss and demand can lead to potential price spikes.

Expert Warnings vs. State Dismissals

UC Berkeley's Severin Borenstein warns refinery closures *'would reduce total production faster than consumption will decline, resulting in severe gasoline shortage and unprecedented price increase.'*

Governor Newsom's office has dismissed the \$8 predictions as **"FALSE,"** while Stanford economists anticipate a more modest 15-cent increase. The debate centers on the extent of the increases, not likelihood.

USC Professor's \$8 Analysis

USC Professor Michael Mische's 40-year analysis predicts that gasoline prices could rise to **\$6.43-\$6.45 per gallon** after the closure of Phillips 66, and potentially reach **\$8.43-\$8.44** after a second closure, marking a 75% increase.

His research shows a strong correlation of 0.641 between changes in California's GDP and gasoline consumption.

California's "Island Effect" Amplifies Impact

California's unique fuel specifications and lack of pipeline connections to other U.S. regions create an **'island' market.**

This geographic isolation hinders prompt responses to supply disruptions, often resulting in significant price spikes that exceed normal fluctuations in supply and demand.

Market Vulnerability Demonstrated

Recent incidents highlight California's supply fragility, as seen in the Martinez fire (resulting in a 42-cent increase), the Chevron fire (immediate regional impact), and seasonal maintenance (leading to price spikes).

Single incidents already cause significant increases; their effects will magnify dramatically after a 17% reduction in capacity.

Regulatory Costs Compound Crisis

State taxes, cap-and-trade, and low-carbon fuel standards add **\$1.25 to the price** of each gallon of gas, which is about twenty-seven percent of what you pay at the pump, according to an analysis by the Independent Institute.

These costs **remain the same regardless** of the supply situation, making price increases due to demand even higher for consumers.

Hamas also appears to be unwilling to disarm, which is another major requirement of the peace deal.

Asked by Reuters about whether the terrorist group is willing to disarm, Nazzal was unwilling to give a definitive "yes."

Teens who assaulted former DOGE staffer get no jail time with probation-only sentences

The two teens charged with assaulting a former **Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE)** staffer were sentenced to probation this week.

Edward Coristine AKA "Big Balls" was assaulted on Aug. 3, 2025 in Washington, D.C.'s Logan Circle neighborhood at around 3 a.m. A boy and girl who were both 15 years old were charged in relation to the alleged assault and pleaded guilty in juvenile court, according to WUSA. The boy was charged with felony assault, simple assault, robbery and attempted robbery.

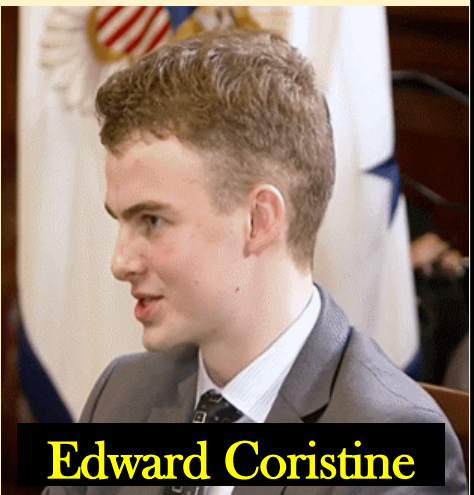
A judge sentenced the boy to 12 months of probation on Tuesday and the girl was sentenced to nine months' probation. The boy pleaded guilty to felony assault, simple assault, robbery and attempted robbery related to the incident, while the girl pleaded guilty to simple assault.

In explaining the decision, the judge said the juvenile court's purpose isn't to punish, but rather to rehabilitate. The judge said she hopes the teens will use the probationary period as a learning

experience.

Following the assault in early August, **President Donald Trump** called out D.C. officials for their handling of juvenile crime.

"Local 'youths' and gang members, some only 14, 15, and 16-years-old, are randomly attacking, mugging, maiming, and shooting innocent citizens, at the same time knowing that they will be almost immediately released," Trump wrote on Truth Social.

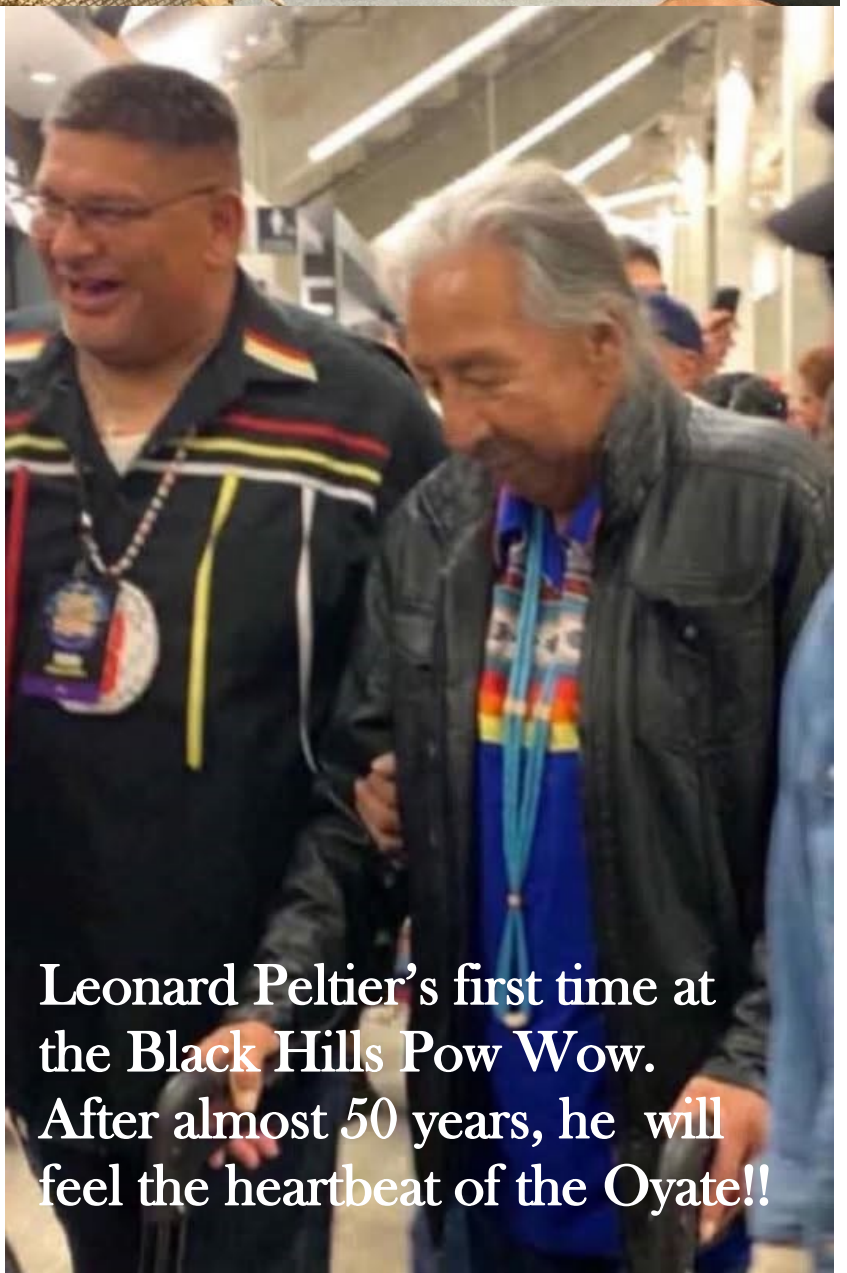

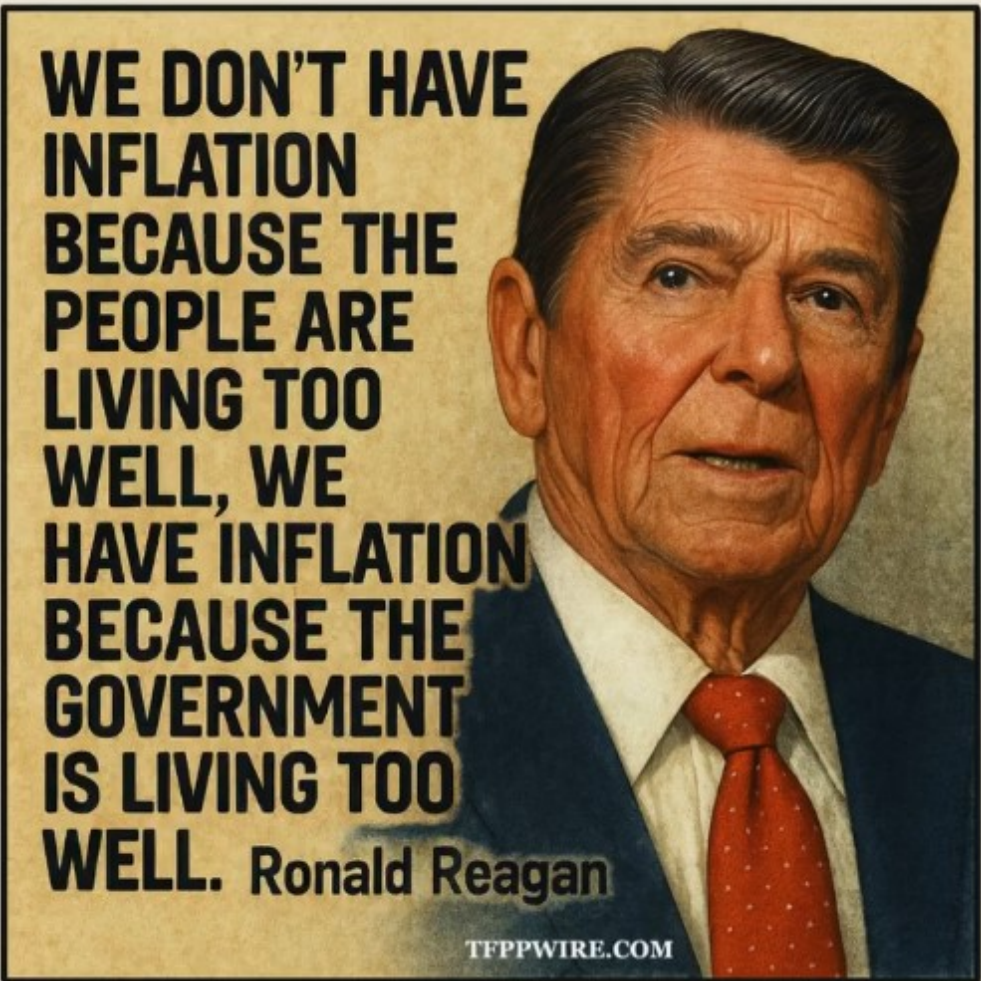

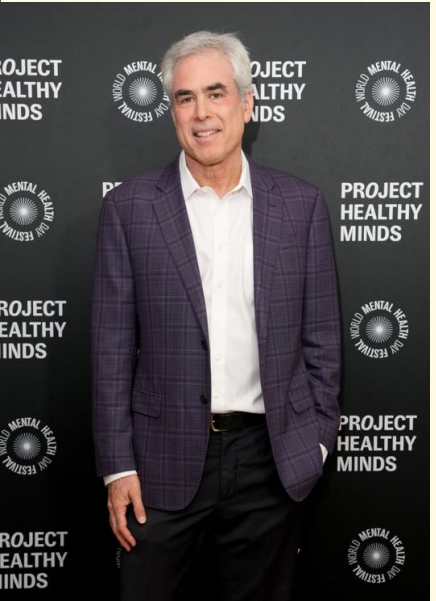

NEW YORK CITY — Before last year, **Jonathan Haidt** was already a well-known social psychologist. He had been inducted into the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, had given four TED talks, and his academic articles had been cited nearly 100,000 times.

unique type of fame after it was published in March of 2024, especially for a nonfiction author. Haidt became a role model for parents installing landlines in their homes and Gen Z luddites using flip phones. It's put him on a pedestal that few in his field have experienced.



Haidt's advice is less about banning screens altogether and more about raising awareness about the ways they're reshaping attention and development. A device's refresh screen, color saturation, notifications and prompt system all impact how technology impacts the brain, while algorithms that feed curated content to users keep users hooked.

The issue is the way improper technology use can fragment kids' attention spans.

"When you change brain development in the first four or five years, it's likely to have permanent effects," Haidt says.

And children who grow up with second screening, browsiwatching a TV show, are training their brains to seek out dopamine. The ng social media while result is a lower threshold for tolerating frustration, and a harder time focusing in the classroom.

"Kids are not afraid of not having a phone," Haidt says. *"They're afraid of being alone or isolated."*

He had four simple recommendations:

- 1) No smartphones before high school;
- 2) No social media before 16;
- 3) Phone-free schools; And
- 4) give kids more independence and play without supervision.

But his latest book, "The Anxious Generation," catapulted him into a

George Will: How the 'velocity of stupidity' is making America worse

Now 84, conservative Washington Post columnist George Will has vivid memories of U.S. conservatism's pre-Donald Trump era as well as the media's pre-internet era.

Will, an ex-Republican turned independent and very much a Never Trumper, believes that President Trump has been terrible for the conservative movement — although he is also a frequent critic of the left. And in his October 17 column, Will argues that technology plays a major role

in accelerating "the velocity of stupidity" and driving America's bitter "polarization."

"A sound of morning silence is coming to Atlanta,"

Will explains. *"The sound of newspapers landing on sidewalks in residential neighborhoods will vanish when, at year's end, the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, joining a national trend, stops publishing print editions. Turning trees into paper, marking it with ink, trucking it to people who deliver it to readers — soon, this laboriousness might be as forgotten as men with tongs lugging large slabs of ice for home iceboxes. The waning of the 400-year era of newspapers is, however, about cultural changes more momentous than the efficiency and convenience of written words presented digitally."*

Will emphasizes that while the digital presentation of news is quite efficient, that efficiency is coming at a major price.

...Will adds, *"These are performative, and they compete for attention with upwardly spiraling shrillness. Hence this distinctively 21st-Century achievement: the velocity of stupidity."*

The Generous of "Blazing Saddles"

Mel Brooks knew "Blazing Saddles" (1974) would push boundaries, but he didn't expect the intense censorship battles that followed. Warner Bros. executives, worried about the film's provocative racial humor and crude gags, demanded several edits. Brooks refused to back down, arguing that the film's impact depended on its fearless satire. Every scene the studio wanted to tone down was one Brooks considered essential.

The infamous campfire scene, where cowboys loudly break wind after eating beans, was one of the first targets. Studio heads found it vulgar and unnecessary, suggesting it be cut or at least shortened. Brooks disagreed, pointing out that Hollywood westerns had never accurately depicted such a basic human moment. He fought to keep every second of it, believing audiences would find it both hilarious and refreshingly honest. His instincts proved correct, as the scene became one of the most famous in comedy history.

A bigger controversy surrounded the frequent use of racial slurs, particularly in scenes involving Sheriff Bart, played by Cleavon Little. Studio executives were deeply uncomfortable with the script's unfiltered dialogue, fearing it would alienate audiences.

Brooks and co-writer Richard Pryor argued that the language was essential to the satire. The goal was not to promote racism but to expose its absurdity by holding a mirror to America's prejudices. Pryor's involvement helped convince the studio to leave the dialogue untouched, though they remained uneasy about audience reactions.

Another major battle erupted over a scene where Sheriff Bart tricks a lynch mob by pretending to hold himself hostage. Executives found the gag too dark, worried that it mocked a deeply painful chapter of American history. Brooks insisted the humor worked because it turned racism on its head, making the bigots look foolish rather than heroic. He refused to cut it, believing it was one of the smartest jokes in the film.

The studio also pushed for a more well-known actor to play Sheriff Bart, fearing that Cleavon Little lacked the star power to carry the film. Brooks refused to budge, confident that Little's charm, comedic timing, and likability made him perfect for the role. His decision paid off, as Little's performance became legendary, proving that the right actor matters more than name recognition.



Brooks' relentless fight against censorship preserved the film's sharp satire, making "Blazing Saddles" one of the boldest comedies ever made. At 98, he still believes that great comedy is fearless, willing to challenge even the most uncomfortable truths.

Alcatraz, The Awakening November 20, 1969 - June 11, 1971



On November 20, 1969, with 89 San Francisco students and other Natives behind him, Richard, along with fellow activist LaNada Means, led a nonviolent occupation of Alcatraz Island that lasted 19 months. The group chose the name Indians of All Tribes (IOAT), and they argued that under the Treaty of Fort Laramie (signed between the U.S. and the Lakota), all abandoned or otherwise out of use federal land needed to be

returned to its original occupants. Alcatraz Prison had closed down a few years earlier, so it was seen as a prime takeover location for the IOAT. Richard Oakes stated:

"We invite the United States to acknowledge the justice of our claim. The choice now lies with the leaders of the American government - to use violence upon us as before to remove us from our Great Spirit's land, or to institute a real change in its dealing with the American Indian. We do not fear your threat to charge us with crimes on our land. We and all other oppressed peoples would welcome spectacle of proof before the world of your title by genocide. Nevertheless, we seek peace."

At the height of the occupation of Alcatraz there were 400 people on the island. This number dwindled, however, as families peeled away for different reasons, including conflict within the group itself. Richard himself left after his stepdaughter was killed after falling off a cliff. Eventually the government cut off all power and water to the island.

Despite its seeming failure, the occupation had some positive outcomes. For one, it brought international attention to Native American activism. It also had a direct impact on future legislation, and it also set an important precedent for Indian activism and protest, opening fresh avenues for dialogue and unity between Indian tribes.

On September 20, 1972, American Indian activist Richard Oakes was shot and killed. He confronted YMCA camp manager Michael Morgan, who had accused a local Native boy of stealing horses from the camp. Morgan was a known white supremacist and according to testimony had labeled Oakes a "troublemaker" who "was half crazy and that he'd be better off dead."

When Oakes went to talk to Morgan about harassing the Native child over the missing horses, Morgan drew his handgun and shot Richard, who was unarmed. Morgan claimed he feared for his life and that Oakes had threatened to kill him.

Morgan was charged with voluntary manslaughter, but was acquitted by an all-white jury who agreed with his story that he had acted in self-defense. To this day, this decision is controversial; there is evidence that the jury was motivated by racial bias.

In the spring of 1942, Chester Nez was just 21 when he became part of a top-secret military experiment. He was one of 29 young Navajo men recruited by the U.S. Marines for a mission that sounded impossible: develop a battlefield code that the Japanese couldn't crack. The twist? It would be based on the Navajo language—a complex, unwritten tongue with sounds and structure almost completely unknown outside the community. Nez and the others invented an entirely new coded system using Navajo words to represent military terms. “Turtle” meant tank. “Iron fish” meant submarine. “Chicken hawk” meant dive bomber. It wasn't just translation—it was encryption, layered in metaphor. And it worked. From Guadalcanal to Iwo Jima, the Navajo Code Talkers transmitted over 800 error-free messages under fire. Japanese cryptographers never came close to breaking it. It remains the only oral military code never broken in modern warfare. Yet for decades, no one could talk about it—not even their families. The mission was classified until 1968. Chester Nez carried that silence for much of his life. He returned home after the war, worked as a painter, raised a family, and never mentioned the role he played in shaping Allied victory. Not until the truth was finally declassified. When he died in 2014, Chester Nez was the last of the original 29 Code Talkers—a final living link to one of WWII's most extraordinary military secrets. It's a story of language, loyalty, and service that was nearly lost to time. Because sometimes, history's biggest breakthroughs don't come from weapons—but from words only a few could speak.



In 1942, Chester Nez helped create an unbreakable WWII code using Navajo and no one knew about it until 1968. He died the last survivor.

This is Elsie Apachito. At 100 years old, she is the oldest Taos Pueblo military veteran. She was a surgical nurse in the Women's Army Corps for four years during World War II.

Today, October 23, 1983 we pause to remember one of the darkest days in Marine Corps and American history — the bombing of the U.S. Marine barracks in Beirut, Lebanon.

At 6:22 a.m., a truck packed with explosives crashed through the gates of the barracks housing members of the 1st Battalion, 8th Marines — part of the Multinational Peacekeeping Force — and detonated with unimaginable force. Two hundred forty-one American servicemen were killed that morning: 220 U.S. Marines, 18 sailors, and 3 soldiers. Minutes later, a second bomber struck the French barracks, killing 58 more of our allies.

They were there as peacekeepers — young men serving far from home, standing guard in the name of freedom and stability. That morning became one of the worst in Marine Corps and American history.

Some of the surviving heroes are my friends. To this day, I think of their courage, their sacrifice, and the heartbreak that followed.

Today, we also send special thoughts and prayers to the Gold Star families who were made on that horrible morning. I know their pain — and I stand with them in remembrance, pride, and love for their sons and daughters who gave everything for this nation.

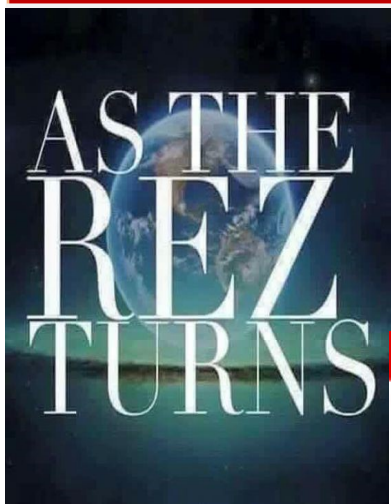
